

**PASTOR'S COLUMN**

Dear Parishioners:

Today we begin Holy Week. This is when the whole church enters into the celebration of the Paschal Mystery of the Lord's suffering, death, and Resurrection. Throughout the season of Lent, many of the prayers of the Mass have referred to our Lenten penance being a preparation for the "coming festivities." For example, on the 4th Sunday of Lent, we prayed that the Christian faithful may "hasten toward the solemn celebrations to come." And on Thursday of that week, we prayed that we would "come safely to the paschal festivities." Holy Week is that time, because it is when the "solemn celebrations" and "paschal festivities" take place.

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, which has a two-fold meaning. The liturgy commemorates Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, and also recalls His suffering and death as the Passion account is proclaimed. This year, the Passion according to Luke will be solemnly proclaimed. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Holy Week are solemn days. The readings at Mass are from the Suffering Servant Songs of the Prophet Isaiah, coupled with gospel passages narrating Jesus' betrayal by Judas. Tuesday evening, the Chrism Mass is celebrated by the Bishop at the Cathedral. Usually, all priests attend this Mass, as it is focused on priesthood – the High Priesthood of Jesus Christ, and the ministerial priesthood. At this Mass, the holy oils are also consecrated by the Bishop. (Please note that due to the Chrism Mass, Eucharistic Exposition and Adoration on April 16 will begin at 4:00 p.m.) Also, on Monday and Wednesday of Holy Week, Confessions will be heard at 7:00 p.m. until all are heard.

The Sacred Paschal Triduum begins with the Mass of the Lord's Supper at 7:00 p.m. on Holy Thursday (April 18). The Triduum is one integral celebration of the Paschal Mystery, spread over three days, with distinct liturgical celebrations of these mysteries; just like Jesus' suffering, death, and Resurrection was an uninterrupted series of events occurring over 3 days time, but which transcend time and history. The Mass of the Lord's Supper commemorates the Last Supper, when Jesus the Lord gave us the Holy Eucharist as the memorial of His suffering and death. His agony in the garden is commemorated by our "waiting and watching" with Him, present in the chapel of repose, throughout the rest of the evening. Please note that the Mass of the Lord's Supper is the only Mass permitted on Holy Thursday – there will be no morning Masses that day.

Good Friday commemorates the death of the Lord. In a solemn liturgy (not Mass, as there are no Masses on Good Friday), the Passion according to John is proclaimed; the Cross of the Lord is solemnly venerated; also, Holy Communion is received. The Good Friday Liturgy begins at 3:00 p.m. At 7:30 p.m., Stations of the Cross will be held. Confessions will be available after the afternoon liturgy, and again after Stations.

Holy Saturday at 8:30 p.m., we celebrate the solemn Easter Vigil. The vigil begins in darkness, and the Easter fire is blessed, the Paschal candle is lighted and "The Light of Christ" is proclaimed. During the Easter Vigil, the Sacraments of Initiation are celebrated for those who are becoming Catholic, and all of us renew our baptismal promises. We also renew our baptismal promises at all Masses on Easter Sunday. All of us became sharers in the Lord's Paschal Mystery through Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. We died and rose to new life with and in Christ. These are the Easter Sacraments! Thus do we celebrate the "paschal festivities" during Holy Week! Happy Holy Week!







# Conversion of Heart

Lenten Reflections on Mercy and Forgiveness

Week 6

READINGS: *Isaiah 50:4–7; Philippians 2:6–11; Luke 22:14–23:56*

## Christ's sacrifice allows us to find meaning in suffering

The Passion of Christ is the pinnacle of all human suffering gathered together in one man, Jesus of Nazareth. He believed you were worth it. He believed everyone, even those who seem farthest away from him, to be worth dying for.

It is through the Cross that we all come to understand God's mercy. In the Crucifixion, the greatest sacrifice the world has ever known takes place. On that tree, God's only Son shows us that the path toward salvation requires his saving power, his unending gift of forgiveness.

God desires mercy so much that he was willing to die to prove to us its worth. In dying he destroyed death, and in rising again he restored us to life. Without this act of ultimate sacrifice, our own sufferings would have no purpose. But because of his pain, we are able to find meaning in our sufferings.

We partake in the mystery of suffering by uniting our trials and tears to Jesus. He suffers alongside us in times of need and never ceases to call us through difficult times to a closer communion with him. In his mercy, we are given hope that one day our darkness will become light

and our sorrows will become eternal joy. We need only to accept our crosses and follow him (see Mt 16:24).

- What crosses are you given to bear during this time in your life?
- How can these crosses help you become holier?
- What does the passion and death of Jesus teach you about the importance of your suffering?

## Faith Lesson

### Our suffering can purify our souls

One of the great deposits of spiritual power in our world comes through what is known as redemptive suffering. We believe as Catholics that our pain and sorrow can be used as a means of spiritual nourishment. When we take on the hardships of life, either voluntarily or involuntarily, we are able to offer them up for the betterment of ourselves and others. In doing so, we do as St. Paul tells us: “Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am fill-


ing up what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ on behalf of his body, which is the church” (Col 1:24).

This begs the question, Was there something lacking in Jesus’ perfect sacrifice on the cross? Of course not! But the effects of sin still remain in our world, much like a house in need of a good cleaning. Redemptive suffering, then, provides us with the ability to “clean up the mess” by purifying our souls and aiding in the sufferings of others. We thus work together with God and unite our pain to the cross, where it is nailed, put to death, and poured out into the world in the form of healing, understanding, and hopefulness.

### The great denial was forgiven

Peter was one of Jesus’ closest followers. He was one of the first called by Jesus and stood by Jesus at almost every moment of his public ministry. However, when it came time for Jesus’ passion and death, Peter denied his master and was too ashamed, or afraid, to see his Lord die at the Crucifixion. After Jesus rose from the dead, one of his first tasks was to assure Peter that his sins were forgiven and that he would lead the rest of the apostles after Jesus’ ascension into heaven.

St. Peter committed one of the worst sins a person can commit when he denied the man who he knew to be the Son of God. However, his repentance was pure and his sorrow was genuine. When he was forgiven by Jesus, his sadness and anguish were like coals turned into diamonds of an unshakable faith and an unquenchable thirst for souls.

God’s mercy has a way of changing the very fabric of who we are. May he fashion our souls into the great saints we were meant to be.
